

## Working at Betsi Cadwaladr University Local Health Board

Health Board is the largest health organisation in Wales, providing a full range of primary, community, mental health and acute hospital services for a population of around 676,000 people across the six counties of North Wales (Anglesey, Gwynedd, Conwy, Denbighshire, Flintshire and Wrexham) as well as some parts of mid Wales, Cheshire and Shropshire.

The Health Board employs around 16,500 staff and has a budget of around £1.2billion. It is responsible for the operation of three district general hospitals (Ysbyty Gwynedd in Bangor, Ysbyty Glan Clwyd near Rhyl, and Wrexham Maelor Hospital) as well as 22 other acute and community hospitals, and a network of over 90 health centres, clinics, community health team bases and mental health units. It also coordinates the work of 107 GP practices and NHS services provided by North Wales dentists, opticians and pharmacies.

## **Glan Clwyd Hospital (Ysbyty Glan Clwyd)**

Glan Clwyd Hospital is located in an area of recognised natural beauty with Snowdonia, stunning pristine beaches and enchanting castles all nearby. The local area offers a wide variety of lifestyle and family options, and for those keen to maintain ties further afield, the area has excellent transport links including fast direct trains to London. The cities of Chester, Manchester, and Liverpool are within In addition, the hospital and health board has excellent academic links with The University of Bangor, Glyndwr University, as well as close links with medical schools in Cardiff, Swansea, Liverpool and Manchester. There is a very active programme of Medical and Dental Education at both Undergraduate and Postgraduate levels. The renal department consists of 3 consultants, working a separate renal and general medicine on-call. All consultants cover the Haemodialysis unit, and look after peritoneal dialysis and renal transplant patients.

The renal team consists of 3 Consultants, Specialty Dr, 1 x SpRs, 1 x IMT, FY1, Physician Associate and are supported by specialist nurses in chronic kidney disease, Renal anaemia, transplantation, peritoneal dialysis, as well as dedicated consultant psychologist, renal pharmacist, renal dietician and Renal social worker.

Ward work is based on ward 9, which is shared with the endocrine team, and on average we have 16 inpatients at a time.

There will be a varied inpatient workload consisting of general medical problems admitted via A+E/Acute medical unit, patients admitted with renal diseases or acute kidney injury, dialysis patients directly admitted from the unit, or unwell transplant recipients. Patients are also admitted for renal biopsies, or for radiological procedures.

Description of placement

The department is staffed with a mixture of Consultants, SAS Doctors (24/7 middle grade rota in operation) and juniors. In addition, there is a strong nursing team including ENPs, extended scope physiotherapists and an evolving team of Advanced Nurse Practitioners. Our department is part of a new build Emergency Quadrant, completed just over 5 years ago, future proofed to deal with an annual attendance of

70,000. The Emergency Quadrant includes an acute medical unit, surgical assessment unit, and a co-located GP OOH unit. We last year enhanced our model of care through the development of a Same Day Emergency Care (SDEC) unit for ambulatory cases, which is now supported by a full-time acute physician. This joint medical and surgical unit was the first of its kind in Wales, and helped attract national attention for the innovative way in which we had joined these teams, and developed new pathways from ED. We are planning to augment our service with the addition of a frailty unit and a GP admissions area

This is a ward-based post with on call commitments. There are excellent educational facilities and opportunities with regular general medical regular meetings (three a week). The post delivers on general medical foundation learning opportunities including exposure to a wide variety of medical conditions on call, enabling taking a history and examination, developing a plan of investigation and management, excellent exposure to perform practical procedures. Up to date is available. Specialty education offers a weekly gastroenterology education meeting which the post holder will contribute to, demonstrating knowledge acquisition and presentation skills, as well as understanding the importance of clinical governance with regular governance and case based audits of team members. We are a large training practice in a seaside town in North Wales serving around 17,000 patients from a wide demographic. The practice has a long history dating back to 1850. We are based on two sites – one main site in the town centre close to West Rhyl which has most deprivation and a second branch practice (Ty Elan) in the quieter Eastern area serving more elderly people with complex medical conditions. We serve some 15 nursing and residential homes as well as many older people living alone with little support. Research projects are always taking place at Clarence Medical Centre. We also have 10 surgical registrars and 4 advanced nurse practitioners.

There are various facilities to deal with various patients, both needing inpatient care and on an ambulatory basis.

There trainees are always supervised, there is consultant or SpR lead ward round every day and everyone is expected to communicate and work as team.

The trainee will get a broad experience of managing emergency and elective general surgery patients.

During emergency they will be exposed to patients with acute abdomen, learn how to resuscitate and manage acutely unwell patients along with supervision of seniors. They will learn about complex decision making, including but not limited to decisions about surgery, consent process, communication with patients family, braking bad news, end of life decisions etc.

There are opportunities to attend theatres, learn basic surgical skills, assist complex surgeries including bowel cancer surgery both during elective and emergency cover.

Ward 11

F2 post in Respiratory medicine and general medicine on call rota. The Respiratory ward has 24 beds including 4 NIV beds. There are 2 respiratory teams on the ward to cover these beds each made up of 1 respiratory consultant, 1 respiratory registrar, an F2 or IMT and 1 F1. There are daily board rounds at the start of each weekday which are led by consultants but junior medical staff participate in. Consultant ward rounds occur twice a week and a registrar ward round once a week. The F2 is expected to attend the ward rounds, present patients, participate in education on the ward round and co-ordinate subsequent investigations, collection of results and complete discharge summaries. The F2 is also expected along with the F1 to complete 2 ward rounds each week. Consultants attend the ward daily in the afternoon to discuss cases and results. In addition to NIV the ward also has high flow nasal oxygen and an Ultrasound machine giving opportunities to learn about their use in respiratory medicine. In addition to the ward there is the possibility of attending both general respiratory clinics and specialty clinics including difficult asthma, lung cancer, pleural, ILD, COPD and bronchiectasis. There is also the opportunity to attend one of 2 procedure lists each week and gain exposure to EBUS and thoracoscopy in addition to Bronchoscopy. The F2 participates in the general medical on call rota in a F2 slot. This includes ward cover and seeing patients on a non selected take. The F2's work weekdays, weekends and nights. Consultant ward rounds occurs twice daily to review patient seen by junior medical staff. The respiratory department has an educational departmental meeting every Monday and the F1 will take part in a rota to present cases/topics

#### **General Information:**

Three days per week will be spent undertaking traditional training rotating through the specialities above. Two protected and defined days per week will be dedicated to a combination of specialised research and teaching. We would encourage you to contact us early to discuss the post, in particular the research elements.

In Intensive Care you will be working as part of the ICU team, including out of hours work.

# **Teaching**

One day per week will be spent in the North Wales Clinical School, Glan Clwyd hospital. You will assist in delivering the undergraduate curriculum for medical students in year 3, 4 and 5 from Cardiff and Manchester medical schools. You will support a full-time specialist registrar grade teaching fellow that is already in post, and the remainder of the undergraduate team. Duties will include ward-based teaching, simulation training, facilitation of tutorials and development of undergraduate training materials.

You will also lead and deliver our Widening Access to Medicine Programme, in collaboration with the Welsh Government Seren Network which is established in our region. This important programme supports students from local state schools in their application for medical school. You will be responsible for ensuring that the programme is delivered. The programme includes interview practice, UCAT preparation, small group work, essay, and work experience during July (COVID permitting). By applying for this post, you are committing to this voluntary and altruistic activity, which takes place over 16 evenings during the academic year – all Wednesdays, from 1700-1930. There are three of you, so there can be an element of self-rostering of cover for each evening. Your specific responsibilities will include:

- Publicising the programme to your colleagues so that sufficient faculty are available each week (we need 8 faculty members each week, made up of doctors of all grades and medical students).
- Publicising the programme to school students at the welcome event.
- Providing training to volunteer faculty (don't worry we will train you first!).
- Timetabling and communications with faculty and students.
- Running and troubleshooting each session (on Teams or in person depending on the COVID situation).
- Ensuring that an essay is marked and returned.
- Participating in the delivery of the work experience week in July.

The actual programme and materials already exist, but there may be a requirement to update them as the years go by, and you will be involved in this too.

You will be really well supported in this activity by Dr Glen, Dr Menzies, and by the clinical school – but it is a genuine and serious responsibility so if it doesn't appeal, please do not apply for the post.

#### Research

One day per week will be devoted to research. The area of research will depend on your individual circumstances and interests. The health board will **fully fund an MRes** within the Clinical Specialised Pathway Framework within the Institute of Health and Medical Research at Bangor University for you. This includes allocation of a clinical and a specialised supervisor, access to modular research training as dictated by your current level of knowledge and training, and support to submit your thesis.

In addition to undertaking and MRes by research, the following research and audit opportunities exist:

- Integration into the Clinical Trials unit at Glan Clwyd hospital
- Participation in both non-commercial and commercial trials currently recruiting on our site
- GCP training if needed
- Support from the clinical audit department

The choice of MRes project will be determined by your interests but possible examples include:

- Evaluation of the impact of a secondary care smoking cessation service on the health and wellbeing of patients admitted to hospital
- Morbidity and mortality associated with suspected and confirmed pulmonary embolism
- Impact of mepoluzimab on asthma patients in a secondary care asthma service
- Utility of a dedicated pleural disease database in secondary care and outcomes of thoracoscopy

In ICU, you will be involved in the care of critically ill patients, under supervision. We offer the full range of standard intensive care treatments including invasive ventilation, inotropic support, renal replacement therapy, and intraortic balloon counterpulsation. Our 13-bedded unit is in the North Wales Cardiac Arrest Centre, which means that we have close relations with our interventional cardiology colleagues. You will have opportunities to learn invasive vascular access (central lines, arterial lines, dialysis lines), as well as ultrasound: we have 2 FUSIC mentors in the unit. You will get used to managing sick patients, and learn to present complex patients succinctly – a key skill for any clinician who wishes to be taken seriously.

You will attend our weekly multi-disciplinary meeting, monthly M&M, monthly Clinical Governance meetings, and Journal Club. You will be expected to present at Journal Club and at M&M. You will also attend regular anaesthesia and ICM teaching.

Finally, you will have an opportunity to work with our outreach team, learning to recognise and stabilise the acutely deteriorating patient.

The information that follows is based on the experience of one of the 2020-21 trainees the end of their academic FY2 year, and has been updated for 2022-23 academic year.

## Intensive Care Unit (First floor)

- 08:30 17:00. Morning handover is at 08:30 (DON'T BE LATE!). Most people change into scrubs beforehand, ask someone to point you in the direction of the theatre changing rooms to collect them.
- Each day there is a consultant led ward round in the morning, so get stuck in and review patients using the proforma.
- Afternoons are for doing the jobs, reviewing new admissions, and seeing patients on the wards
- Anaesthetics ICU teaching programme monthly but ask questions any time.
- There is a separate ICU induction document this on a smartphone app and will be sent to you.
- There are plenty of opportunities to do procedures like arterial lines if you would like to.
- You'll be added to the ICU Medics WhatsApp group, which will contain everyone on ICU and will have useful information shared in it.
- Two consultants cover ITU during the week (daytime)

- Junior team during the day varies but is generally 2 middle grades (SpR or trust grade) plus a mix of other grades including you.
- You be part of the ICU team. You will be well supported. There will always be a higher ICU grade present. You are expected to review patients on the unit, attend emergency calls and get involved as much as you can.
- During your ICU placement you will contribute to out of hours work, including nights. You will be well supported in this by 3 other doctors: two anaesthetists (who also cover theatre and obstetrics), and a third doctor with ICU experience. If bad things are happening out of hours the consultant will generally be there.

- We will ensure that out of hours working does not impact on your other commitments, but flexibility will be needed on both sides.

Respiratory Ward 6

Welcome to the academic foundation year two programme at Ysbyty Glan Clwyd (YGC). This job involves Intensive Care, Respiratory Medicine & General Practice over three four-month rotations, plus an ongoing researching & teaching commitment.

In respiratory you will join our established team of 5 consultants, and junior doctors on the respiratory ward. The ward contains a 4 bed nurse-led NIV unit with provision for treatment with nasal high flow oxygen. You will gain exposure to and experience in treatment of a variety of respiratory conditions, including COPD, asthma, ILD, pneumonia, pleural disease (including drain management), lung cancer, and (of course) COVID. The team is supported by a number of dedicated respiratory nurse specialists, a ward based ANP, an integrated research team, and a teaching and interventional respiratory fellow who you will work alongside.

There are dedicated clinics in COPD, difficult asthma, lung cancer, pleural disease, ILD and bronchiectasis as well as general respiratory clinics which you are welcome to attend. You are also welcome to attend our weekly lung cancer MDT and radiology meeting and to take part in the weekly departmental educational meeting.

There are twice weekly procedure lists undertaken which you can attend and learn the basics of interventional bronchoscopy (including EBUS and endobronchial valve insertion), thoracoscopy and chest drain/indwelling pleural catheter management.

Throughout the year you will spend: three days per week working as part of the clinical teams; one day per week completing a Masters by Research (MRes) with Bangor University; & one day a week in the North Wales Clinical School (NWCS).

In order to finish the year you need to complete exactly the same FY2 competencies as your full-time clinical colleagues.

## **Description of Placement**

The community paediatrics service has 6 WTE permanent members of staff based in Rhyl and Colwyn Bay. We support many of our most vulnerable young people and their families — including those who attend our special schools (many of whom have complex neurodisability e.g. Autistic Spectrum, Cerebral Palsy, Down Syndrome), supporting young people who are in care: Looked After Children (LAC) or are in the process of being adopted. We have special roles in children's safeguarding: completing child protection medicals, while also supporting health professionals with complex safeguarding cases and working closely with social workers and children's services to ensure we meet the health needs of young people who are in care. We have very strong relationships with education and schools, ensuring that young people have the appropriate help and support to reach their educational potential. We also support children with specialist continence needs.

FY2s will be offered a comprehensive 6 week induction – this will include sitting in at a variety of our clinics and specialist school clinics. There will be opportunity to observe a child protection case conference, and if appropriate observe a fostering or adoption panel. Trainee will spend time in our Child Development Centre, including observing sessions in the classroom / joint assessments with the speech therapists / early years specialist nursing team. Trainees will all spend ½ to 1 day each with a variety of therapists including: speech therapist, occupational therapy, portage, school nurse, health visitor, paediatric dietitian, physiotherapist. They will spend time with the neurodevelopmental team and have the opportunity to follow a neurodevelopmental assessment and observe their MDT.

In the 2<sup>nd</sup> 6 weeks, trainees will have the opportunity to work side-by-side in clinics with a permanent member of the team, taking histories, examining children and under appropriate supervision, developing and initiating clinical management plans. This will give trainees the opportunity to develop clinic skills alongside formulating clinic letters and management plans.

The F2 doctor base is Hafod a CMHT in Rhyl. Hafod provides primary and secondary community mental health service to the North of Denbighshire. The post holder will see patients in clinic with the supervision of a consultant psychiatrist.

Opportunities exist to spend time in psychiatric subspecialties including SMS, forensic, OPMH, LD and CAMHS.

The post holder will take part in an on call rota at the Ablett unit. Providing medical cover to the psychiatric wards including off site wards in Colwyn Bay and Ruthin.
